





ROOF, 9 cities, 1 objective ending homelessness

For the past 3 years, in the framework of URBACT, 9 European cities have been putting the objective of ending homelessness into practice. ROOF's aim is to end homelessness through innovative housing solutions at city level. It is about making the shift from managing homelessness to actually ending it through Housing First/Led and about gathering accurate data. In the last 3 years the ROOF cities engaged in exchange and learning activities on a transnational and local level, while testing and planning new ways of working and changing mindsets. All cities developed integrated local Action Plans to promote and achieve the strategic goal of Functional Zero (no structural homelessness). Key in the network process were the design led approach to create social change and the focus on advocacy and storytelling to change the minds of the different stakeholders.

Ending homelessness from different starting points: adopting and adapting known solutions


Each ROOF city is located in a specific geographical place with its own history, present and future implications. They are of different cultures and habits and most of all, their local and national policies as well as their experience on Housing First are at very different stages. Being a part of the URBACT programme created an opportunity to bring different points of view and experiences together, to advance from different starting points while adopting and adapting proven solutions to specific contexts.

Some cities needed to start from zero and understand how to change the local mindset and put the first milestones to introduce Housing First as the most sustainable solution. Other cities explored scaling-up without losing quality. And a couple of advanced cities took the opportunity to work on prevention or long-term sustainability. All cities agreed that the exchange between the cities has been the most insightful part of the ROOF network.

Learning from a crisis...

COVID-19 took everybody by surprise leading to dramatic changes affecting our social systems. Including the 9 ROOF cities, who suddenly found themselves in an unwanted situation. The crisis forced them to respond quickly and to change strategies in a more agile way. Over time it has become clear that the pandemic also has brought some valuable lessons and unexpectedly positive and surprising effects: homeless people being housed for the first time in small temporary houses, rough sleepers finally being housed after many years, use of nontraditional infrastructure to house homeless people, cross-stakeholder collaboration and a changing public opinion.

...to adopt agile policy making strategies

As the pandemic generated more agile policy making strategies, so did the URBACT Small Scale Action (SSA) plan. URBACT encouraged the cities to try-out Small Scale Actions; the aim of these actions is to learn from tests, measure the results and either adapt, upscale or reject actions to be included in the Integrated Action Plan. Beyond that, the testing itself gives each municipality the rare opportunity to become more agile in their way of working and to activate all relevant local stakeholders with a vision in mind and a concrete first step to take.

Through their specific SSAs the ROOF cities tested new tools and methods for providing better services, new communication and advocacy tools, and different ways to collect and use data.

Moving towards actually ending homelessness by implementing Integrated Action Plans ...

Each city now has a detailed action plan and a strong local group to support the activities. The collaboration with local stakeholders developed through the project is recognised by the cities to be one of the success factors for their actions.

An Integrated Action Plan (IAP) is a policy instrument that can be used to respond in a concrete way to a policy challenge. Each IAP is unique, in terms of local context, theme and coverage. It is integrated because it is addressing the different dimensions of the problem, i.e. social, economic, health and environmental dimensions, and considers the various territorial levels relevant to the solutions to be implemented.

...using the Design Led approach to create social change...

The Design Led approach pushed all ROOF activities. This meant adopting a problem solving approach, seeing opportunities in challenges, and using data as means towards solutions. The methodology followed was divided in non-linear steps:

Inspire: creating a shared vision and forming ambassadors for the change that is about to happen.
Sustain: collecting and growing data in order to support change and orient the advocacy trajectory.
Learn: building capacity and growing expertise for the local networks.

•Activate: putting ideas into actions useful to demonstrate that the direction taken is correct or interesting.

•Evaluate: evaluating and using the actions taken to

address the next steps in the cycle.
